



From the Pastor...

Dear First Presbyterian Church;

As we move through Advent, I invite you to use these days of preparation as an opportunity to reflect on your Christian journey, asking, "Does my life reflect the faith, hope, and love that Christ calls all believers to show?" Throughout our lives, God provides us with choices to make and the wonderful truth about this gift of "free will" is that, with each day, we can select the more faithful paths to travel. My prayer for all of us is that, as God guides us with the example of the Lord of Bethlehem before us, our church will grow more and more to become the loving neighborhood we are called to become.

As a faithful community, one of the most important characteristics we are called to reflect is, "humility." The words, "humility" and "humble," are used over 100 times in Scripture. Time after time, we are told to show humility and, yet, so often, neighbors compete with each other to be the "best" and, in every area of our lives, there are individuals who are "puffed-up" with ego and pride. Interestingly, in the game of Chess, though there are many powerful pieces (e.g. the Queen, Bishop, and Rook), one of the least powerful pieces is the King himself. The King can only move one space at a time and is always in a position of being protected. Humbly, the King simply lives to prevent the other side from becoming the winner. Which chess piece do you prefer to become? Along with the King, perhaps, the humblest player is the Pawn who only moves one space in one direction and serves as the "front-line" in whatever strategy is developed.

Let us strive to serve humbly, remembering that, from God, not us, all blessings come. The person next to us is no less a child of God than you and I and that's a truth that will help us to be humbler.

May God continue to bless you with the joy and hope of the Thanksgiving and Advent seasons.

Second Week of Advent PEACE

"Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. . . . Do not let your hearts be troubled," said Jesus in John 14:27. "Peace! Be still!" said Jesus to the sea when a frightening storm arose (Mark 4:39). Was he also talking to his disciples, giving them peace instead of panic?

I was surprised this week at how many of the Prophets' passages about Hope include Peace. The description of the "Peaceful Kingdom" is found in Isaiah 11. All animals, both predator and prey, and children will live, eat, and rest together. "They shall not hurt or destroy on all my holy mountain." (v.9) I think Isaiah includes people in the word "they." In Isaiah 2 the Future House of God is described, and v. 4 says "they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war anymore." Wow! We still have that to hope for!

While we are waiting for this peace, what are we doing to help bring peace?

In the meantime, we do have access to the personal Peace Jesus gives us. He told his disciples that he was the vine and they were the branches. Are not also modern-day disciples' branches? If we stay connected to the vine, through prayer, that Peace will enter us. Paul in Galatians 5 lists Peace as one of the Fruits of the Spirit. If we listen to the guidance of the Holy Spirit, that peace will be ours. If we call on God when we feel panicky, we may hear the words: "Peace! Be still!"

After emphasizing the importance of prayer to obtain Peace, Henri Nouwen (a 20th Century writer who was more articulate than I am) says: "It is so important for people around you to see that peace of Christ reflected in your eyes, your hands, and your words. There is more power in that than in all your teaching and organizing."

As the Apostle Paul might say, May the peace of the Lord Jesus Christ be with you now and always. Shalom. Joyce Kelly
